And he sees that as heroic!' she says in describing the situation), her husband Tan-Tan is unfaithful, the discovery of which is the threshold she must cross to begin her hero's journey. The day starts with Xavier being tasked with preparing a wedding banquet for the daughter of an influential man. His special ability is seasoning food with just the palm of his hand. But Xavier also has the title of macaenus, a coveted and specially appointed position where he prepares a once-in-a-lifetime meal for everyone when they need it most. He is also haunted by his wife, who died at sea, and stalks the islands while her body slowly disintegrates. This is just the beginning of a fantastical journey filled with the wondrous pleasures of dreams and the intensity of nightmares. At one point in the novel, there is a magical explosion that affects all the women on the island, and their suffering is so shocking.

This research aims to identify and delve into gender equality by presenting empowered female characters and challenging patriarchal norms. For this reason, the researcher chooses to analyze it using Wollstonecraft's theory of feminist liberalism, which focuses on gender equality. According to Mary Wollstonecraft, In her seminal work "A Vindication of the Rights of Women," Wollstonecraft passionately argued that women are not inherently inferior to men but rather lack equal opportunities for education and societal participation (Wollstonecraft, 1792), which is considered to be the beginning of the liberal feminist movement. She believed that women's intellectual potential was stifled by the prevailing norms of her time, which relegated them to domestic roles devoid of agency and scholarly pursuits. She shows the logic that women become independent and morally strong like men. If different education systems are applied to men and women, then this is not only unfair but also counterproductive, and the nation will become "artificial and weak in character". She compares women who marry rich men who are professional and entrepreneurial and have no incentive to work outside the home to the "feathered race," namely birds in cages that do nothing but a feather. (Wollstonecraft, 1792).

After reading and reviewing several reviews and related research, the researcher found reviews and previous research relevant to this research. Researchers use reviews and related research as racing or related studies.

The first review of the analysis of liberal feminist characters often serves as embodiments of progressive ideals, challenging traditional gender norms and advocating for equality. The second review of liberal feminism in literature can be seen in Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's novel "Half of a Yellow Sun." Through characters like Olanna and Kainene, Adichie explores themes of education and career in Nigeria during the Biafran War. This paper aims to examine how masculinity is represented and resisted in Ngozi Adichie's Half of a Yellow Sun. In a patriarchal society, male dominance is more or less a law, while resistance by females becomes a duty. The female gender has been variously constructed and derogatorily represented in male writings, and Adichie, in her novel Half of a Yellow Sun, makes bold to challenge this status quo. She creates female characters who are the embodiment of beauty, intelligence, industry, and courage. On the contrary, the male characters and their roles in the novel cast aspersion on patriarchy. These characters navigate societal expectations and strive for self-determination, embodying liberal feminist ideals of empowerment and choice in the face of social and political upheaval (Adichie, 2006).

Based on those above aspects, researchers are engaged in an analysis of the novel This One Sky Day by Leone Ross. The first reason is the intriguing characters. Second, there is debate and power between the characters, which presents gender equality, which has not been discussed much in the novel. Consequently, the author requires further research to gain a deeper understanding of gender equality in the novel.

The researcher uses liberal feminist theory to examine the feminism, liberalism, and patriarchy of the novel This One Sky Day by Leone Ross.

# A. Culture patriarchal in the novel This One Sky Day by Leone Ross

This dialogue illustrates how, as a male character in a position of authority, he feels that the responsibility and ability to make decisions lies entirely with him. The first dialogue also depicts how a man finds it hard to show mistakes or apologize. This reflects a patriarchal dynamic in which women's voices are often ignored or considered less important than men's voices, which serve as the primary authority in important decisions.

**Marginalization of Women's Voices**, Women in the novel frequently find their voices and opinions marginalized. They are often expected to adhere to the roles and behaviors prescribed by a male-dominated society. Female characters are usually confined to traditional roles that limit their agency and influence. These roles reinforce the idea that women's primary responsibilities lie in supporting roles rather than leading. The dialogue says that the cursed brothel provides free services to married men. This sentence constitutes the marginalization of women because it can result in ongoing injustice, discrimination, and inequality in terms of rights, opportunities, and access.

Women are judged and regulated based on how they conform to or deviate from these norms. There is a recurring theme of women's bodies being objectified and controlled, whether through societal expectations or interpersonal relationships. Bonamie didn't say the word mule, which is a colloquialism for a barren woman. Mule, a short jook of a word. (Ross, 2021:30). A woman who must watch themselves, sake pretty frock, and wedding party cloud judgment. (Ross, 21:44). From the data, it is known that Anise and most of the women on Popisho Island accept the fact that they experience inequality and injustice throughout Popisho, as in the quote, "woman who has to watch herself, sake pretty frock and wedding party cloud judgment" where women are required to have their strength in facing sexism, patriarchy, and male privilege.

**Critique and Subversion**, Despite the pervasive patriarchy, the novel features strong female characters who resist and challenge these norms. Their struggles and resilience serve as a critique of the patriarchal structures they navigate. The complex relationships between characters provide a nuanced exploration of how patriarchy affects both men and women, revealing how power dynamics play out in intimate and communal settings. The following dialogue example shows how criticism is directed at women in the novel This One Sky Day.

They were laughing, except for Bonamie, pouting because of the men in the crowd: You too skinny, gods, how you look so mawga? Anise prodded her shoulder and reminded her about the boys back in Pretty Town who often strained to see her long waist and slender feet. Bonamie looked relieved. (Ross, 2021:73). These data show that Anise and most of the women on Popisho Island received criticism from those closest to them.

Cultural and Societal Reflection, the novel depicts the constraints and challenges imposed by patriarchy and celebrates the resilience and agency of those who resist it. It is set in a fictional archipelago called Popisho, heavily influenced by Jamaican and Francophone Caribbean cultures. She'd offered Tan-Tan's help more than once, but the old lady merely shook her head and pressed sorrel tea and slivers of goat's cheese into her hands. I don't get any children, she said. And a woman with no children learns to accept many things. Anise could almost see the pain between them, like a corporeal thing, making the hot air shiver." (Ross, 2021:29)
